KING COUNTY TOBACCO PREVENTION PROGRAM—The Tobacco Prevention Program is conducting Tobacco Compliance Checks throughout King County at licensed tobacco retailers (stores.) We utilize 15-17 year old students to conduct what essentially is “undercover” or “secret shopper” operations. Every purchase attempt is supervised, and students

are trained and supervised by another student who has been conducting these checks and comfortable doing so. It's a great opportunity, and gives some exposure to students with interest in law enforcement and other legal careers. It is also a fun way to get out and see the county, as we cover all of King County from Enumclaw to Woodinville to Shoreline to Federal Way.
